### Jewish, black students tour South

Over 20 black and Jewish high school students launched a civil rights tour of the South. The 22 students who left Washington Wednesday morning are part of Operation Understanding DC, an organization that aims to bring together black and Jewish students to eradicate discrimination. The eleventh-graders from across the D.C. area will visit towns in Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, Tennessee and North Carolina where key events in the Civil Rights Movement occurred. They are scheduled to speak with current and past civil rights leaders and visit a variety of Jewish, Baptist, Pentecostal and Muslim congregations. They will visit the balcony where Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated and the last Orthodox synagogue in Mississippi, among other places. This annual trip comes at the end of a six-month program of meetings and lectures. The goal of the trip is to help participants develop leadership roles in community engagement and civil rights. When they return, the students help facilitate workshops throughout the community.

### Muslim, Orthodox Jew to run N.J. township

A practicing Muslim and an Orthodox Jew have been chosen to run a New Jersey township. Mohammed Hameeduddin was picked last week by the Teaneck Township Council to serve as mayor and Adam Gussen was chosen as deputy mayor for two-year terms. Hameeduddin, Teaneck's first Muslim mayor, is one of only a handful of Muslims to lead a U.S. municipality. The leaders attended middle school together in Teaneck, which has a large Orthodox Jewish population, and both attended Rutgers University, according to ABC News. "Nowhere else is this possible," Hameeduddin told ABC. "The opportunity to bring two communities together and break down stereotypes that have belittled our nation is both monumental and humbling."

### American university heads visit Israel

A delegation of American university presidents visiting Israel met with their Israeli counterparts and discussed opportunities for academic collaboration. The 13 presidents, including the

heads of Cornell University, the University of Miami, California Polytechnic State University, the University of South Carolina, Oregon State University and San Jose State University, were in Israel July 5-11 under the auspices of Project Interchange, an educational institute of the American Jewish Committee, July 5-11. The university chiefs received in-depth briefings on state-of-the-art research initiatives, and they discussed opportunities for academic collaboration and exchange at the undergraduate, graduate and faculty levels. They also met with senior government officials, including Israeli President Shimon Peres, Palestinian Authority Prime Minister Salam Fayyad and U.S. Ambassador to Israel James Cunningham. Aharon Barak, the former president of Israel's Supreme Court, and Daniel Reisner, the ex-head of the International Law Department of the Israel Defense Forces, led discussions on various legal topics, including human rights and international law. During a meeting Sunday at Israel's Foreign Ministry, the university presidents told Deputy Foreign Minister Danny Ayalon that they intend to enhance cooperation and promote projects that link universities in the United States, Israel and the Palestinian Authority, Ayalon's office said.

### Jerusalem chosen Africa/Mideast's best city; Tel Aviv No. 3

Jerusalem was voted the No. 1 Best City in Africa and the Middle East and Tel Aviv No. 3 by the readers of Travel+Leisure magazine. Jerusalem reached the top spot for the first time since 2000. Tel Aviv, which was behind Cape Town, South Africa, made it to the top 3 for the first time. The results are published annually in the magazine's August [issue](#). "We are thrilled by this result because it underscores the growing realization by sophisticated travelers that our two main cities are unique and extraordinary places to visit," said Arie Sommer, Israel's tourism commissioner for North and South America.
